

Theme 2: From 1990 to 2020

Create a personal visual story about a European / Spanish historical theme

Step 1: Choose a topic

Choose a topic from the list in Appendix 1 that you / another person you know relates to **personally** / can talk about (this can be done alone or in a team).

Step 2: Plan your own story

Reflect on the topic you have chosen: how can you create your own personal visual story?

Two options:

- A. Create your own visual story based on your own personal experiences
- B. Interview a person that you know (friend, family, acquaintance or somebody you have not met before) that has a personal connection to this topic¹

Think about the main ideas for your story and create an outline/storyboard/mindmap. Remember that the main approach of the project is to create a combination of photographs and text for your topic, but if you come up with other creative ideas for this (poem, painting, video, storytelling etc.), feel free to include those.

Step 3: Take and collect pictures

Three options:

- A. Collect photographs from relatives, friends and acquaintances²
- B. Take your own pictures
- C. Combination of A and B

¹ It is important to get written permission from any person you interview if you include their material in your story.

² If you want to use pictures taken by the person being interviewed, you must also obtain written permission from this person

Think carefully before you take/select the picture/s and think how you can improve your storytelling with these. All the pictures used for your story **must be original** (i.e. not taken from the internet).

Tip: be creative with your pictures: you can make your own drawings or take pictures of everyday objects/things, etc.

Step 4: Create and upload your story

- 1. Select the most informative photos (minimum 1 minimum maximum 5) and combine them with your outline/storyboard
- 2. Write the final story (maximum 250 words) you want to present and create an order for the images if you have more than one
- **3.** Think of a catchy title for your story
- 4. Think of a title/description for each of the pictures
- Write down related hashtags for the story. You always need to include the #shiftingwalls_eu
- **6. Upload your story** either directly on the shiftingwalls_eu account or any other account using the #shiftingwalls_eu
